Call Staffing:

This chart provides the duty crew staffing levels for the number of incidents. Our minimum is two (at least one Paramedic). Several calls involved the response of paid-on-call staff

Two FFs on duty: 15 (24%)

HAAS Traffic Alert Activations:

This chart provides the data surrounding the recent installation of the HAAS Safey Cloud warning system in six of our apparatus. The system allows us to track our fleet's location, traveling speeds, and number of vehicles that were notified by our apparatus when they had their lights and sirens on. In June:

- We alerted **2,918** total drivers through in-vehicle devices (vehicle navigation/detection systems, Waze® maps, or Apple® maps. So far, we have alerted 4,823 drivers since we installed the system in July 2024 and 497 in July of 2025.
- Our system detected 262 minutes of response time. This is captured by the number of minutes an apparatus is detected going lights and sirens from one spot to another (i.e.: from the fire station to a call, one call to another, or an incident transporting someone emergent from the scene to a local emergency room). The emergency response time from the start-up of the apparatus and activating the emergency lights to the incident scene was 6.6 minutes.
- Our system detected **13.5** minutes of average on-scene time (e.g.: a fire department vehicle parked in or alongside the road warning approaching drivers of an incident with their lights on at a scene).

Fire Station/Infrastructure:

- Extensive yardwork and cleanup was completed at both stations including weed removal, edging, tree trimming, adding fresh mulch under all trees, and redoing the garden beds.
 Most of this work was done in-house by LTFR employees, some of who came in off-duty to help. Great job to all!
- An updated website was released.

Leland Township Fire Rescue

Emergency Medical Services:

- Passed our annual licensing inspection with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services with zero deficiencies.
- Supply ordering and truck inventory continued.
- Provided EMS standby for numerous events in July including the fireworks, Fourth of July Parade, and Fishtown 5K.

Vehicle Repair, Maintenance, Changes, or Information:

- Alpha 593 (ambulance) Tires rotated.
- All apparatus were waxed.

Fire Prevention/Community Involvement:

- Continued installing smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms in Leland Township. residences, in the month of June.
- Approved numerous burn permit requests, in compliance with the DNR and township. ordinance, in the month of July.
- Provided CPR Training to several community members.

Change of Status (personnel):

- Sasha Moore promoted from Firefighter/Paramedic to Community Risk Reduction Coordinator (CRRC) and will oversee our CRR/Fire Prevention Division.
- **Kyle Evans** promoted from part-time Firefighter/EMT to full-time. Kyle will be assigned to the Red Shift and will start his full-time career here the last week of August.
- Dawson Williams promoted from part-time Firefighter/EMT to full-time. Dawson will be assigned to the Green Shift and will start his full-time career here the last week of August.
- Cameron Pehrson resigned from the department and has taken a full-time Firefighter/Paramedic Position in the Detroit Area. Cam served LTFR for three years. We thank Cam for his service to the community and wish him well in his new chapter.
- James Hill Will be moving out of the area and has resigned from the department. We wish James the best.

Miscellaneous Things Involving Our Department:

• Fire Chief Besson and Captain Schelling developed Incident Command and emergency response plans for the major events in the month of July.

- Fire Chief Besson and Captain Schelling attended an Advanced Cardiac Life Support and Pediatric Advanced Life Support instructor course. These courses are required every 2 years for all paramedics. This instructor training will allow these courses to be offered in-house and will eliminate the need to send employees out for this training.
- On July 3rd, LTFR provided standby for the fireworks at Hancock Field. Assigned to the standby were both Advanced Life Support ambulances, Ladder Truck, ATV, and Brush Truck. Additionally, Grand Traverse Band Fire & Rescue brought their Mobile Command Post to the event. Thank you, Chief Fairchild, and GTB! During the fireworks display, the primary ambulance responded to an EMS call in the township (unrelated to the event). Remaining personnel provided standby with no incidents reported.
- On July 4th LTFR participated in the annual Fourth of July Parade.
- On the evening of July 4th, LTFR provided standby for a small fireworks display in Leland. No incidents were reported.
- On July 19th LTFR provided standby and assisted with traffic control for the Fishtown 5K.
 Assigned to the standby was an Advanced Life Support ambulance and Fire Engine. No incidents were reported.
- On July 17th LTFR was requested by Suttons Bay-Bingham Fire & Rescue to respond with an ambulance to a two-vehicle accident with injuries on SW Bayshore Dr. Alpha 593 responded with the Duty Crew from Lake Leelanau and transported one patient with minor injuries to Munson Medical Center. While Alpha 593 was responding on this call, an additional call for service was received in the Village of Leland for a fire alarm. Capt. Schelling and the Shift Officer (Sgt. Johnson) staffed Ladder 531 and responded to this incident, which was a false alarm. Shortly after returning to the Station, an additional EMS call was dispatched. Capt. Schelling and Sgt. Johnson staffed the second ambulance and responded to the call.
- On July 22nd LTFR was dispatched to a residence in Leland Township for a patient who had fallen. Alpha 591 and Engine 512 both responded. Upon arrival, the patient was exhibiting symptoms of a serious head injury. Advanced Life Support care was provided, and the patient was transported with lights & sirens to the Trauma Center at Munson Medical Center. Due to the patient's condition, the Shift Officer who had arrived in Engine 512 drove the ambulance to Munson to allow both two EMS personnel to provide care during transport.
- On July 24th LTFR along with mutual aid from Suttons Bay-Bingham Fire & Rescue, Grand
 Traverse Band Fire & Rescue, Leelanau Township Emergency Services, Cedar Area Fire &
 Rescue, and Leelanau County Sheriff's Department was dispatched to the 3000 Block of
 Noth Lake Leelanau Dr. for a possible residential structure fire. The caller reported to the
 dispatch center that the smell of smoke was present the home. Engine 511 responded from
 the Lake Leelanau Station and arrived on scene within 9 minutes of dispatch. Lt. Brandon
 Morse established command and arriving personnel began investigating. The source of the

smell was found to be an overheated light ballast. A Thermal Imaging Camera, which can detect hidden heat, was used to verify that there was no fire in the ceiling or other areas of the residence. No hazards were found and all units returned to service.

 On July 31st, LTFR was requested by Cedar Area Fire & Rescue to respond to an two-vehicle accident with injuries at the intersection of Schomberg Rd. & Gatzke Rd. Alpha 591 responded and transported one patient with non-life threatening injuries to the Trauma Center at Munson Medical Center.


